A Message from our Principal ...

Acting Principal

I will be on leave for the remainder of this term, and to ensure as little disruption as possible to the smooth running of our school and the education that it provides our students, Ellie McDougall has been appointed to the Acting Principal role. Ellie returns to our school from her Education Improvement Leader role based in the Horsham Regional office of the DET. Ellie knows our school very well and I am confident that she will do an outstanding job in the role.

Student Voice

Our school surveys its students regularly to assess their welfare, and where concerns are identified these are closely followed up by our very strong student welfare team. While



student welfare is obviously a high priority, so too is their learning. It is very exciting that we are once again conducting the twice yearly Pivot Survey. This survey gives every student the opportunity to provide feedback on their learning including their teachers, the appropriateness of lesson content, the delivery of that content, the level of say they have regarding what is done in their classrooms, as well as many other areas and factors that can influence their level of learning. All teachers receive these results and are strongly encouraged to reflect upon them closely. Student

feedback often brings things to the attention of teachers that they may have been completely unaware of, and this can be of invaluable assistance to the effectiveness of their classroom teaching.

Student reports

Our first student reports for the year will be finalised next week and available to parents and students during the following week. Our staff have been encouraged to make use of multiple sources of data to determine the learning levels of all of their students. This enables teachers to provide point of need teaching and also to determine the individual student learning growth that has occurred in their classes. Our student reports are designed to be frequent and brief, but parents are always very welcome to seek greater detail regarding a student's report by making contact with their Year Level Coordinator. All parents are also encouraged Student/Parent/Teacher to attend our conversation sessions.



VCAL Program Wins State Award

This week our school was very excited to hear that our nomination for the state wide VCAL Achievement Awards has been successful. Our school has won an award in the category of **Partner Award – VCAL Partnerships** with Multi Industry Trade Taster. A huge congratulations to our VCAL students and staff. Illuminate Program


After a disrupted start to our Illuminate program as a result of the flash flooding and consequent shortage of available rooms, the program is now well underway. Our Literacy Learning Specialist Mr Healey has provided our staff with excellent support to enable them to maximise the impact of the program. Our staff are all very aware that it is every teacher's responsibility to improve student literacy levels, and that by doing so our students will demonstrate improvement in all of their subjects. Mr Healey will be working with both students and staff to ensure that all students involved in the Illuminate program will get the most out of it and maximise the improvement to their literacy levels.

Introduction of Compulsory English Homework

As part of our school's continued focus on improving student learning, we will be implementing a compulsory English homework program. This program will require students to complete a series of short and meaningful tasks each week focusing on foundational English skills for reading, writing and speaking. VCE English classes will focus on content from the current unit and maximizing their exam and School Assessed Coursework (SAC) results. All students will be required to complete homework and return it to their English teacher by due dates set by the classroom teacher. Consequences will result for students not completing the set homework, including lunchtime and after school detentions where appropriate, and during the detention they will be required to complete the set work. Our school is committed to providing students with the best opportunities to maximize their learning and improve their literacy skills. We appreciate your support in helping us to provide your child with the best opportunities to maximize their learning and literacy skills.

Boost to Music Department

Thank you to Head of Music David Thompson for his organisation of the purchase of new state of the art sound and recording equipment. Our school has been waiting for the arrival of this equipment for some time and we are very excited about its arrival and it being set up and ready for use. This will provide our current and future students with outstanding musical opportunities.

Ararat College is now using Maths Pathways for students in Years 7-10. For those new to the school or not familiar with the program, here is an outline of what students do in Maths.


The Maths Pathways program works on two week cycles. During each cycle students who are in Years 7 and 8 are required to complete at least six

modules and Years 9 and 10 are to complete at least eight modules. These modules are chosen by students with guidance from their Maths teacher based on their current level of Mathematics. The modules are online, however, students are required to complete the working out and answers in their books. Students are required to self-manage the completion of the required amount of modules and this will usually require the completion of at least one module for homework each week.

In several lessons during a cycle, mini-lessons are held for small groups of students. These are run by our Maths Helpers as well as classroom teachers. These mini-lessons allow the groups to focus on areas of difficulty in the curriculum.

One lesson in the cycle is devoted to a RICH task that is designed to improve students' problem solving skills and promote team work.





At the end of each cycle students complete a test. Each test is individualised for the student and consists of two parts — the paper test and the online test. Once the test is completed students are given a chance to reflect on their answers and fix any mistakes made. Every student is aiming to achieve a minimum 100% growth for each test — equivalent to three mastered modules. Classroom teachers hold feedback interviews with each student to discuss test results, areas of improvement and to set learning goals for the next test cycle.

I would strongly encourage all parents to access the parent portal on your child's Maths Pathways dashboard. An email address can be entered to receive a notification every time your child has a test result to view. You will need to ask your child for their password in order to login. MADISON HEWITT | BOOK AUTHOR: JENNIER NIVEN




All the Bright Places is a book written by Jennifer Niven following two characters named Theodore Finch and Violet Markey.


The story differentiates between the two in their journey of life. Violet's view is focused on college and dealing with her sister's death, until she meets Finch.


