

On Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> of October, six Ararat College students came to the Gnurad - Gundidj campus of the School for Student Leadership. For that last three and a half weeks, we have all been learning new skills, ranging from how to work more productively as a team, to how to use OneNote on our computers, along with another thirty-eight students from around the state. Our school is paired with six students from Hoppers Crossing Secondary College, meaning we do most of our team activities with this group.

A few days ago, we went out on our first "expo" where we all went for a 25km walk along the Great Ocean Road, with each of us carrying a pack weighing somewhere between 15 and 20 kilos. We camped for the night halfway along and, in total, it took us about 24 hours to complete the hike. 


All students are expected to attend exams. Please contact Mr Reynolds with any questions.

Eleven-year-old Maggie lives in Fennis Wick, enclosed and protected from the outside world by a boundary, beyond which the Quiet War rages and the dirty, dangerous wanderers roam. Her brother Jed is an eldest, revered and special. A hero. Her younger brother is Trig - everyone loves Trig. But Maggie's just a middler; invisible and left behind. Then, one hot September day, she meets Una, a hungry wanderer girl in need of help, and everything Maggie has ever known gets turned on its head. Narrated expertly and often hilariously by Maggie, we experience the trials and frustrations of being the forgotten middle child, the child with no voice, even in her own family. A gripping story of forbidden friendship, loyalty and betrayal.

When her announce their impending parents separation, Natalie can't understand why no one is fighting or at least mildly upset. Then Zach and Lucy, her two best friends, hook up, leaving her feeling slightly miffed and decidedly awkward. She'd always imagined she would end up with Zach one day - in the version of her life that played out like a TV show, with just the right amount of banter, pining and meaningful looks. Now everything has changed and nothing is quite making sense. Until an unexpected romance comes along and shakes things up even further. It Sounded Better in My Head is a tender, funny and joyful novel about longing, confusion, feeling left out and finding out what really matters.
