A message from the Principal.....

Mr Sawyer

On April 1st Mr Sawyer officially retired from his position as Principal of Ararat College. Mr Sawyer has worked in government education for more than thirty six years, and whilst it will be difficult to acknowledge and celebrate all of his contributions throughout this time, I would like to try to capture some of the highlights of his wonderful career!

Mr Sawyer started his career as a teacher at Stawell Secondary College in 1984 and was promoted into a Leading Teacher position by 1996. In 2001 Mr Sawyer started his journey in principal class positions when he was appointed as Assistant Principal of Stawell Secondary College. In 2005 Mr Sawyer took up the Principal position at Hopetoun Secondary College, during this time he was highly regarded by the community for his dedication to providing a high quality education for students and families. Mr Sawyer was part of a study tour to Canada and the USA in 2006 which investigated virtual schooling, the learning which occurred on this trip then formed the backbone for the development of the Grampians Virtual Learning Network which still operates today. This network ensures that students are provided with a larger variety of VCE subjects which connect to their interests and career pathways, assisting in bridging the gap between metropolitan and rural schools. Mr Sawyer's contribution to this program was highly valued and essential to its effective implementation.

In 2008 Mr Sawyer was appointed as Principal at Ararat College. During this time Geoff worked hard to secure many facility upgrades and building works which increased the capacity for our school to provide the best possible learning environment. This has included our Trade Training Centre, the development of the School Farm site, the refurbishment of the Science Language Centre, Barwick Park and an upgrade to the Administration Building. Mr Sawyer was actively involved in a wide variety of committees and associations, most notably he served as Secretary for the Wimmera Secondary Principals' Association for ten years and completed this role with much distinction. This contribution was recognised in 2016 when he was presented with the 'Brendan Ryan Award for outstanding leadership in the Wimmera Network.' He was also the driving force behind the creation of our local VET cluster which includes Stawell Secondary College, Marian College and Lake Bolac College.

Mr Sawyer readily gave up his time to mentor leading teachers and new principals. He was often required as a panel member for principal selection at schools across the Wimmera, as his wide experience in principal class positions (nineteen years in total) made him well suited to this task. Personally I was fortunate enough to be the recipient of Mr Sawyer's mentorship and support throughout my teaching career, which has shaped the educator into whom I am still developing. Mr Sawyer has a belief in his students and staff and this ensures they are fully supported to reach if not exceed their potential. Many of us will remember Mr Sawyer as a passionate Hawthorn supporter and fisherman – I remember going on the Year 9 camp with Mr Sawyer leading a fishing session with the students.

Mr Sawyer is the embodiment of our school values; respect, responsibility and excellence. He is passionate, diligent and dedicated. Ararat College is indebted to him for his contribution to our school, and government education is a better place for having him a part of it. No words can truly describe the impact Mr Sawyer has had on schools and their communities

throughout his career. I wish you all the best in your retirement Geoff — may there be many fish, Hawthorn premierships (not too many!) and time with your family. I hope you continue to be "living the dream."

As a result we have made one adjustment to the requirements for Year 7 & 8 (Junior School) – for elective subjects, students will be supplied with one task per fortnight, there is no due date for these tasks and there will be no other activities or announcements uploaded to the Google Classrooms for this subjects. For the purpose of remote learning elective subjects include: Art, Graphics, Technology, Food, Music, Health, IT, Humanities, Textiles and French. As always please get in touch if you have any questions or concerns.

Senior students should be following their timetable and need to work hard to ensure they are completing the required tasks so that they remain on track for their VCAL and VCE completion. I understand a number of our senior students are in the workforce so it is also important that they maintain an appropriate work/school/life balance. Our Senior School Teachers are eager to assist wherever possible, students need only ask for extra support through SMT (xuno) or phoning the school on 5352 4177.

I continue to be impressed by the way in which our whole school community is adapting to the current challenge of learning and working from home. It has been great to see students joining our virtual lessons and check-ins and working hard to complete the tasks that have been set. This week we even started some of our instrumental music lessons via pre-recorded lessons! It is important that we stay motivated and keep working hard to achieve to our potential — a lot of resilience is required. Our welfare team Taylah and Steph are still conducting appointments with students so please contact them if you would like additional support.




Wall of Gratitude




A big thankyou to Taneka Day who has made sure Hey Hey is well fed and has plenty of food every day. To quote one teacher "Hey Hey is a model student".

This week Year 7 Food Studies have been challenged to cook Pizza. They could design their own flavourings. If they could access the ingredients, they were also to make their own base.




In need of a laugh?

Have your circumstances changed?

I light of the recent events related to the Covid 19 pandemic, there may be families who have applied for Centrelink benefits and may now be eligible for the Camps ,Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF). If you now have a healthcare card that is valid from the **14th April 2020**, you may be able to apply.

CSEF payment

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

If you believe you are eligible to apply for this funding or need further information please do not hesitate to contact the college office 53524177.

Please note that CSEF program for 2020 closes on **26th June 2020**. Applications must have been processed by this date.
