


Year 9 Science

The eSafety Commissioner is the world's first government agency committed to keeping its citizens safer online. eSafety has powers relating to cyberbullying, image-based abuse and illegal and harmful online content. Their aim is to help people of all ages be safe online. eSafety can help Australians experiencing online bullying or abuse to take action or make a complaint and can also get information removed from online platforms. eSafety have a wide range of resources for students, parents and teachers including lessons with links to the Australian Curriculum.



I came across the eSafety Commissioner a few years ago and have been completing professional development with them annually. The latest session that I participated in focussed on online harmful sexual behaviours, misinformation and emerging technologies. It covered the following:

- identifying online harmful sexual behaviours, developing skills to support students'
- knowledge of consent, online respect and refusal skills.
- identifying the impact of online misinformation and supporting students to develop
- skills to critically evaluate information and trusted sources.
- exploring the social and safety implications of emerging technologies and
- understanding the key safety skills young people require.







Everyone loves a murder mystery. Here are two new additions to the library.




